
Historians think of two types of information about the past:



Primary sources are created by eye-witnesses who record the event

Secondary sources are created secondhand, by people who were **not present** at the event

Primary sources include such things as letters, diaries, photographs, interviews, newspaper articles, and many other types of documents. They are the raw material historians use to find evidence to answer their questions about the past.



Secondary sources are thoughts about a topic based on the primary source material. Secondary sources include such things as published books and textbooks.






Why Use Primary Sources?

- A primary source is as close as you can get to what you are researching.
- When you use primary sources you are finding your own clues to the information. You are not using someone else's ideas. You are discovering your own answers as you look at a picture, examine a map, read a newspaper article or handle an object from the past..
- Good researchers use both primary sources and secondary sources to help them understand what they are researching..

Questions to think of when you are using Primary Sources

- Who created this?- Is it signed or is there a name on it?
- When was it created? Is there a date on it or clues about when it was made?
- What is the purpose of it? To record an event? To persuade people?
- What information does it give me? How will it help me answer my questions
- What questions does it raise? What do I want to know now that I have seen this?
